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Community Health Centers Save Money

- They save \$24 billion a year in reduced overall costs from hospitalizations and visits to the emergency room
- They created more than 230,000 jobs in 2012, a 22% increase since 2009
- During the George Bush Administration, the Office of Management and Budget (OMB) gave Community Health Centers three stars the highest rating possible as an effective federal program

Community Health Centers Deliver Quality Care

- Nearly 100 % of surveyed patients were satisfied with the care they received at a community health center
- Research shows that health centers demonstrated equal or better quality performance than private practices on ambulatory quality measures, despite serving patients with more chronic disease and socioeconomic challenges

Community Health Centers Offer Access to Care


- Health Centers offer weekend and evening hours for working families
- Health Centers offset the recent decline in overall availability of primary care providers
- Health centers provide quality, affordable healthcare close to home to the first-time insured
- When people have access to primary and preventive services at a health center, they stay healthy and avoid costly hospital visits

Community Health Centers are built on a foundation of public/private partnership

- Loss of any type of funding could result in a loss of access to care for many of the 23 million people currently served at health centers and trigger increased healthcare costs
- Community health centers are economic engines. In 2012, health centers generated more than \$26.5 billion in economic activity for local communities, a 33 % increase since 2009. The loss of funding could trigger job losses, not only at the health center, but also surrounding businesses






In Louisiana/ outside of the New Orleans Region

- Loss of \$17M in funding (would include \$6M non-GNOCHC and \$11 M GNOCHC)— would affect/reduce/eliminate care to 30,000 patients statewide.
- An Economic impact multiplier is at work here- so a loss of \$17M has the impact of a \$23 M loss.
